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Using more than a decade of data from the Arizona Department of Child Safety, state and federal agencies, and nonprofit partners, CSI examined long-term trends in child welfare outcomes and system demand. **The data show sustained improvements aligned with stronger economic conditions and policy shifts emphasizing prevention, reunification, and kinship care.**

Child Welfare Trends

Out-of-home care caseloads have declined as economic conditions and prevention efforts strengthened.

Kinship and reunification placements now account for a larger share of interventions.

The data emphasize the importance of evaluating child welfare policy using long-term trends.
